Students are given the opportunity to brainstorm their aspirations, make goals, and identify steps to achieve these goals.

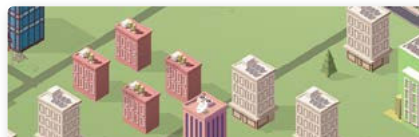

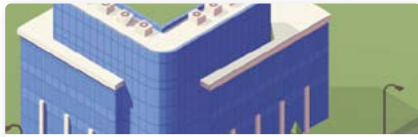
